


EXTENSION OF ASCOBANS AGREEMENT AREA COMES INTO FORCE ON 3 FEBRUARY 2008

We have good news and certainly reason to celebrate! The extension of the ASCOBANS Agreement Area, agreed on by Parties at MoP4 in 2003, will enter into force on 3 February 2008. Finland was the fifth country to formally accept the Amendment to the Agreement, following France, Denmark, Germany and the Netherlands. The Agreement's name will also change to reflect the new geographic coverage: "Agreement on the Conservation of Small Cetaceans of the Baltic, North East Atlantic, Irish and North Seas".

With the significant enlargement of the area covered by ASCOBANS westward, not only did ASCOBANS gain three more Range States, Ireland, Portugal and Spain, who will continue to be encouraged to join the other ten Parties as member states, also its political footprint will be significantly larger. The new areas of the North East Atlantic and Irish Seas bring with them different species compositions and a wider set of issues and threats that need to be addressed. But they also increase the scientific expertise the Agreement bodies can draw from and provide a chance to coordinate conservation measures of small cetaceans more effectively in a wider context. The next Meeting of the ASCOBANS Advisory Committee in the spring of 2008 will further consider the implications of the extension for the organisation and work plan of the various Agreement bodies.

The map below shows the original Agreement Area and the extension, demonstrating the significant gain in cetacean-rich waters. It also gives an overview of Parties and non-Party Range States to the Agreement. The ASCOBANS area will then be contiguous to that of its sister Agreement, ACCOBAMS.



The CMS/ASCOBANS Secretariat will be very happy to assist those five Parties that have not yet completed their adoption in any way possible. All Range States joining ASCOBANS after the extension comes into force will automatically accede to the Agreement as amended.

JOINT ASCOBANS/HELCOM WORKSHOPS

After three very intense and productive days of workshops in the ASCOBANS Secretariat's seat in the UN Campus in Bonn (8-10 October 2007), the experts invited to the Population Structure Workshops left with a bit of "homework".

The first two days were used to consider the advantages and limitations of different methods to study cetacean population structure and dynamics and for reporting on the state of knowledge with regard to the harbour porpoise, the bottlenose dolphin, the short-beaked common dolphin, the white-beaked dolphin and the Atlantic white-sided dolphin. The group then started to draw up a summary of methodological approaches and their features, including a rough power analysis, with a note on the costs and sample sizes required for each method. This will be published together with the proceedings and recommendations on population differentiation or possible management units for each of the species under consideration to provide policy makers with the information needed to make informed decisions.

The third day considered the current knowledge about genetics and population structure of the Baltic harbour porpoise. Due to its rarity, it is extremely difficult to study and the available information shows many gaps. Therefore, the group decided to prepare a project proposal for EU funding for an international and interdisciplinary coordinated research effort, providing not only an overview of available material, but also helping to connect the various actors around the Baltic Sea who are studying and trying to protect this small and possibly distinct population.

ASCOBANS WORKING DINNER ON THE MARGINS OF CMS STC 32

In the margins of the Standing Committee meeting, an informal meeting was convened by the Federal Ministry for the Environment of Germany, which involved the Chair and Vice-Chair of the CMS Standing Committee (UK and Australia), the Chair of the ASCOBANS Advisory Committee, the representative of the MOP5 Chair (the Netherlands) and the joint Secretariat. The group discussed interim results of the merger of the Secretariats, including both positive aspects and problems encountered. They then turned their attention to the future and considered ideas and strategies for the time until the next ASCOBANS MOP, in order to make the new Secretariat arrangement a success. The open and constructive discussion will no doubt help in setting the priorities for the next months.

CMS/ASCOBANS RESEARCH AND EVENTS CONTRACTOR

As some of you have noticed, a while ago a vacancy announcement for this consultancy was posted on the CMS and ASCOBANS websites. Ms Melanie Klussmann, who was selected for the position, had already been supporting the CMS Inter-Agency Liaison Officer for some time. While her salary is covered 100% out of the CMS budget, the joint Secretariat benefits from her services both for CMS

and for ASCOBANS tasks. These include, for example, preparation of the WATCH meeting, held in October in Tenerife, including document production, assistance with the preparations for the ASCOBANS/HELCOM Workshops in early October in Bonn, background research as needed by the CMS Scientific Officer and the ASCOBANS Coordinator and preparation of presentations for various meetings. Her free support is greatly appreciated by the ASCOBANS team.




THE 6TH INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE BALTIC HARBOUR PORPOISE

I hope to get to know all of you and to see you around."


PROGRESS OF THE YEAR OF THE DOLPHIN CAMPAIGN

The Year of the Dolphin, a joint campaign of seven Partner organisations, ASCOBANS being one of the founding Partners, and more than 40 official Supporters worldwide, tries to achieve these basic objectives:



- To increase general awareness of cetacean conservation issues and promote active involvement of adults and children alike;
- To provide effective education and information tools for outreach to a broad audience;
- To create strong partnerships and provide a platform for joint activities and common goals for UN
 agencies, the private sector and NGOs; and
- To fundraise for and stimulate concrete activities for the conservation of these species and their habitats and thereby contribute to the 2010 biodiversity target.

Among the over 140 requests for granting of supporter status for the Year of the Dolphin received by the CMS Secretariat from all over the world, were requests from NGOs, universities, research institutions, the media, museums, national parks, the corporate sector and individuals such as journalists, teachers, sailors, whale-watching guides, artists etc. Governmental support in form of voluntary contributions and other funding, distribution of information material or provision of dedicated websites came also from the ASCOBANS region: Belgium, Germany, the Netherlands and Spain.



Many other activities, such as public awareness raising among local communities and tourists, publications on the YoD, educational activities in schools, public events, research and dolphin conservation or launches were initiated in 22 countries around the globe. The map on the left shows clearly that Europe has been a hot spot of Year of the Dolphin activities, with so many events in fact that it was impossible to have them all represented individually.

The Year of the Dolphin has been in-

strumental in the production of a wide range of outreach and educational material, sensitising adults and children alike for the conservation needs of small cetaceans. Thousands of copies of the leaflets, dolphin manuals, posters, postcards etc. have been distributed worldwide, with countless downloads of material from the <u>dedicated website</u>, which also offers the "Dolphin Diploma", a very popular online award for children.

A major conference organised within the framework of the Year of the Dolphin, WATCH – Western African Talks on Cetaceans and their Habitats (16-20 October 2007, Tenerife, Spain), paved the way for the conclusion of the fourth CMS Cetacean agreement. The meeting consisted of two main parts: a) two days of Open Symposium with more than 120 people present, with a variety of interesting presentations both on conservation status and threats of cetaceans of the African Eastern Atlantic Basin and cetacean-related aspects of sustainable development, mainly focussing on best practice in whale and dolphin watching activities (proceedings under preparation); and b) a Government Negotiation Session with over 50 delegates, representing 23 countries, who decided on the way forward for a Memorandum of Understanding for Small Cetaceans and Manatees in Western Africa, stretching from Morocco to South Africa, including Macaronesia and also the inland Range States of the West African Manatee. Associated Action Plans were discussed and substantial progress made towards their finalisation. Range States hope to meet again in 2008 (depending on availability of funds) to conclude the agreement.
